Executive Summary

The Cleveland County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 2021 through FY 2022.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Cleveland County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

<u>Priorities for Funding:</u> Through a Risk and Needs Assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Cleveland County (The list is in no particular order or priorities).

- 1. Association with Negative/Delinquent Peers/Gang Association
- 2. Family Needs: Domestic Violence Exposure, Family Criminality and Substance Abuse
- 3. Inadequate Parental Supervision
- 4. Mental/Behavioral Health Needs: Assessment/Counseling/Treatment
- 5. Prior History of Delinquency/Recidivism
- 6. Serious School Behavior Problems/Suspensions/Truancy
- 7. Substance Use/Abuse

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on an annual basis. (See Monitoring Reports Attachment).

<u>Funding Recommendations:</u> Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Public Safety-Community Programs Section Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY <u>2021-2022</u> (See JCPC Funding Allocations page):

- 1. Juvenile Mediation \$ 30,000.00 (Two Year Funding)
- 2. Roots and Wings; PAYS/STEPS \$ 78,619.00 (Two Year Funding)
- 3. Cleveland Early Intervention, CCS \$ 40,000.00 (Two Year Funding)
- 4. Teen Court, CIS \$ 41,526.00
- 5. Restoration and Community Service, CIS \$ 30,000.00
- 6. Mentoring Program, CIS \$ 34,657.00
- 7. Family Centered Treatment, Pinnacle Family Services, 19,068.00
- 8. Kids at Work, \$40,000 (Two Year Funding)
- 9. PORT Program \$ 24,193.00 (Two Year Funding)
- 10. JCPC Administration \$ 2000.00 (Two Year Funding)

Program Descriptions

CLEVELAND COUNTY 2021-2022 FUNDED PROGRAMS

PORT: Sponsoring Agency: Freedom House of Mecklenburg

Component: Substance Abuse Counseling

Providing Opportunities in Recovery for Teens (PORT) Program provides Substance use screenings, assessments, evaluations, counseling, community-based interventions, and urinalysis for juvenile court involved youth experiencing challenges with substance use. The CADC/CPS, LCAS-A, or CADC-R provides counseling during crisis, counsel youth in the community, assist the family in arranging other services, and assists with transportation when necessary and appropriate. (Two Year Funding)

Component: Mediation/Conflict Resolution:

Restorative Justice Conferencing leads young offenders to take responsibility for their actions by learning and understanding the impact and consequences of their actions and sends them a clear message about accountability. Positive Impact classes are part of the process. These classes give youth the tools to realize the harm their actions have caused, enable them to make better choices and allow them to be accountable for their actions and choices. (Two Year Funding)

Component: Interpersonal Skill Building

Cleveland Early Intervention (CEI) is an interpersonal skill building program based at Turning Point Academy, alternative school in Cleveland Co. Schools. CEI employs a Life Skills Coordinator to teach interpersonal skills to youth placed at TPA that are referred due to social skills deficits. The LSC provides primarily individual counseling with supplemental group sessions; links students to additional services in and out of school and provides opportunities to learn and model new skills. (Two Year Funding)

Component: Teen Court

Teen Court is an alternative to adjudication through the Juvenile Court/District Court. It provides an opportunity for juvenile offenders, who accept responsibility for their

offense, to go before a jury of peers and be represented by a teen attorney. The teen jury listens to testimony and decides an appropriate sentence based on guidelines provided by an adult judge. Upon successful completion, the referring agency will be notified and charges against the juvenile will not be pursued further. (One Year Funding)

Component: Juvenile Restitution & Community Service

The goal is to offer juvenile offenders an option to give back to the community. It leverages local businesses, government agencies, and non-profit agencies to provide opportunities for youth to pay back restitution and offers a way for them to be held accountable and to repair some of the harm caused by their conduct. Monetary restitution is a process by which juvenile offenders are held partially or fully accountable for the financial losses suffered by the victims of their crimes. (One Year Funding)

Parent/Youth Skills Development is a 14 week program using effective strategies to prevent/reduce delinquency that promotes protective family and individual factors such as positive juvenile/parent relationships, effective parental monitoring, social/interpersonal skills and competency through topics such as Communication, Respect/Relationships, Understanding Teens, Self-Esteem, Discipline, Anger Management, Decision Making, Substance Abuse Prevention, Gang Awareness, and Social Media Awareness.

Component: Parent/Family Skill Building

Success Through Effective Parenting Strategies is a 6 week program using effective strategies to prevent/reduce delinquency that promotes protective family factors such as effective/positive parenting, positive family bonds, effective parental monitoring, as well as parental involvement and commitment through topics such as parenting styles, communication skills, building cooperation and self-esteem, redirecting misbehavior, as well as school success. (Two Year Funding)

Component: Mentoring

The program provides a one-on-one relationship with a caring adult for at-risk youth with special emphasis on court-involved youth referred by Juvenile Justice. Referrals are also accepted from Communities In Schools programs, school resource officers, and other community agencies, including partners with the Cleveland County JCPC. (One Year Funding)

Component: Home Based Family Counseling

Family Centered Treatment (FCT) is a Trauma Treatment, best practice, tested and evidence-based model of home-based family therapy developed by practitioners over a 30-year period. FCT is a formalized model of therapy that has practice-based evidence and evidence based practice shown to lower rates of out of home placements, juvenile recidivism, and maladaptive areas of family functioning. It has been refined based on research, experience, and evidence of effectiveness derived from practice. (One Year Funding)

Component: Interpersonal Skill Building

Kids at Work is an interpersonal skills development program based around the culinary arts. Youth are a part of the program for 16 weeks and meet for three hours once a week for instruction. The curriculum consists of 24 hands-on lessons that are designed to meet the clients unique learning styles and help them apply the skills in a work environment. Youth 14 and older also complete training in ServSafe and take the certification exam. All program youth will receive a vocational assessment. (Two Year Funding)
